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Clayville Restoration Project to Receive Statewide Preservation Award

Chicago, Ill. – On Saturday, October 29, the Pleasant Plains Historical Society will be honored with an “Advocacy Award” by Landmarks Illinois as part of the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation Preservation Awards. This 17th-annual event honors individuals, organizations, and projects throughout the state that represent excellence in historic preservation.

“This year’s award-winning projects are a testament to the deep commitment of preservationists across the state,” said Jim Peters, President of Landmarks Illinois.

Once a campus for training historic site manager, the 17-acre Clayville historic site stood vacant for more than a decade. The c1830s Broadwell Tavern, two log cabins, and several outbuildings were in disrepair and forgotten under years of overgrowth. The tavern was listed in Landmarks Illinois’ Ten Most Endangered Historic Places List in 2007.

In 2009, the Pleasant Plains Historical Society was formed with the mission of acquiring and restoring the site. This organization spearheaded the purchase, clean-up, restoration, and preservation of this site through mainly volunteer efforts.

Since this project was completed in March 2010, the site has been utilized for various functions and events by a wide range of community organizations.

Since 1994, Landmarks Illinois has been assisted by a generous grant from the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation to honor those whose work demonstrates a commitment to excellence in historic preservation and inspire others to take action to preserve, protect and promote historic resources throughout Illinois.

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The award itself is a small-scale replica of the entrance arch and a portion of the Trading Room from Louis Sullivan's Chicago Stock Exchange building, which was demolished in 1972. The fight to save this important part of Chicago's built environment led to the founding of Landmarks Illinois in 1971. In addition, winners receive a \$500 cash award.

The awards ceremony will be held on October 29, from 4:30 to 7:30 P.M. at The InterContinental Hotel, Chicago and is open to the public. Tickets are available at \$40 for members and \$50 for non-members. To make a reservation, contact Landmarks Illinois at 312-922-1742.
