Ancel House to Receive Statewide Preservation Award

Chicago, Ill. – On Saturday, October 29, the Ancel House in Glencoe will be one of nine historic sites honored by Landmarks Illinois as part of the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation Preservation Awards. This 17th-annual event honors individuals, organizations, and projects throughout the state that represent excellence in historic preservation.

“This year’s award-winning projects are a testament to the deep commitment of preservationists across the state,” said Jim Peters, President of Landmarks Illinois.

The Ancel House was designed by renowned mid-20th century architect, Edward Dart, in 1961. Its site immediately on Lake Michigan is what drew the current owners, Ellen and David Muslin, to the property. They had originally envisioned tearing the house down to subdivide the lot and construct a new residence. At the time, they were not aware of the significance of the building’s architecture and the importance of this house in the context of its neighborhood.

A public outcry by neighboring property owners caused the Muslins to have a change of heart. They ultimately decided to restore and update the house, while following the Secretary of the Interior’s Standards for Rehabilitation.

The restoration was done with such incredible care and intricacy that it earned the Muslins a Historic Preservation Award from the Village of Glencoe in 2009. Their choice to save this mid-20th century house has also helped to retain the original neighborhood character. “This is a true preservation story of an often-underappreciated period of architecture,” the jury remarked.

Since 1994, Landmarks Illinois has been assisted by a generous grant from the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation to honor those whose work demonstrates a commitment to excellence in historic preservation and inspire others to take action to preserve, protect and promote historic resources throughout Illinois.

The award itself is a small-scale replica of the entrance arch and a portion of the Trading Room from Louis Sullivan's Chicago Stock Exchange building, which was demolished in 1972. The fight to save this important part of Chicago's built environment led to the founding of Landmarks Illinois in 1971. In addition, winners receive a \$500 cash award.

The awards ceremony will be held on October 29, from 4:30 to 7:30 P.M. at The InterContinental Hotel, Chicago and is open to the public. Tickets are available at \$40 for members and \$50 for non-members. To make a reservation, contact Landmarks Illinois at 312-922-1742.
