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### St. Charles River Wall and Plaza to Receive Statewide Preservation Award

**Chicago, Ill.** – On Saturday, October 29, the Municipal Center River Wall and Plaza in St. Charles will be one of nine historic sites honored by Landmarks Illinois as part of the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation Preservation Awards. This 17<sup>th</sup>-annual event honors individuals, organizations, and projects throughout the state that represent excellence in historic preservation.

“This year’s award-winning projects are a testament to the deep commitment of preservationists across the state,” said Jim Peters, President of Landmarks Illinois.

This striking Art Moderne-style complex was designed and built in the 1940’s by famed architect R. Harold Zook. After years of deterioration and multiple alterations, much of the site no longer resembled its original design. In 2009, a \$4 million project was undertaken by the City to rehabilitate and restore the wall and plaza.

The jury noted, “The restoration of the river wall and plaza was an amazing effort by a municipality with a huge payback for the community.”

Since 1994, Landmarks Illinois has been assisted by a generous grant from the Richard H. Driehaus Foundation to honor those whose work demonstrates a commitment to excellence in historic preservation and inspire others to take action to preserve, protect and promote historic resources throughout Illinois.

The award itself is a small-scale replica of the entrance arch and a portion of the Trading Room from Louis Sullivan’s Chicago Stock Exchange building, which was demolished in 1972. The fight to save this

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important part of Chicago's built environment led to the founding of Landmarks Illinois in 1971. In addition, winners receive a \$500 cash award.

The awards ceremony will be held on October 29, from 4:30 to 7:30 P.M. at The InterContinental Hotel, Chicago and is open to the public. Tickets are available at \$40 for members and \$50 for non-members. To make a reservation, contact Landmarks Illinois at 312-922-1742.
